#### RE: \$400 Million GGRF Natural and Working Land Programs Request -- SUPPORT

Dear Senator Mitchell and Assembly member Ting:

We the undersigned organizations stand united with 30 members of the State Legislature (see attached letter) in urging the support of a \$400 million investment in natural and working land programs from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund. This investment, coupled with the ongoing commitment of \$200 million for Forest Health and Fire Prevention is critical to preparing California's communities for climate change and meeting our GHG reduction goals.

Further, we believe the most effective way to ensure all key programs are funded at a modest but equitable level is to delineate the proposed allocation as follows:

# \$70 million – Urban Greening Program administered by CNRA \$50 million – Urban and Community Forestry Program administered by CalFIRE

Urban forests and green infrastructure are the primary carbon sequestration mechanism in our state's densely-populated communities, and are critical to improving health and combatting the increasing urban heat island effect. These programs also help provide urban communities with access to recreation and produce additional benefits, such as flood protection, wildlife habitat, and improved air and water quality.

### \$50 million -- Healthy Soils Program administered by CDFA \$40 million - State Water Energy Efficiency Program administered by CDFA

Climate smart agriculture is critical to transforming traditional on-farm management practices into energy and water-saving solutions. These programs fund projects that allow farms to switch to solar-powered pumps and soil moisture monitoring, and help turn the state's farms and ranches from carbon emitters into carbon sinks.

### \$50 million – Wetland and Mountain Meadow Restoration Program administered by DFW \$40 million – Climate Adaptation Program administered by WCB

Supporting programs designed to manage and restore California's natural and working lands to be more resilient to climate change is key to the State's adaptation goals. Restoring wetlands and wet meadows can sequester huge amounts of carbon, re-establish crucial habitat for fish and wildlife, help buffer extreme storm events and sea level rise, and integrate with forest health efforts to achieve more holistic watershed restoration to protect our water sources.

## \$20 million – Climate Ready Program administered by Coastal Conservancy \$70 million – Other Regional Conservancies

The State Coastal Conservancy's Climate Ready Program supports multi-benefit projects that use natural systems to assist communities in adapting to the impacts of climate change through local action and engagement. Other regional Conservancies can also use existing programs to support and catalyze local action for climate adaptation.

\$10 million for other priorities that could include investments in farmer adaptation incentives, the Ocean Protection Council, the San Francisco Bay Development Commission, and the Coastal Commission.

Combined, these investments are vital to meet our climate goals, and be prepared for the inevitable increase in frequency and intensity of extreme weather events.

We urge the Senate and Assembly to support this \$400 million proposal as the Budget Committees contemplate their GGRF Expenditure Plan priorities in the coming weeks.
